
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Here is a list and information below of the committee liaisons.

ALSA Committee members are selected by the Chair of the Committee and serve a one year term starting July 1 of the current year. The Committee Chair is selected by the BOD liaison of the Committee and also serves a one year term starting July 1st of the current year. The exception to this is the Regional, Grand National, and Fiber Committees which serve a one year term starting December 1st of the current year - following the conclusion of the Regional and National shows of that year. As Committees are selected, it is recommended that members are diversified as to their geographic regions to offer complete membership representation.

Committee Chairs should submit a Committee Report to their BOD liaison for each month's BOD meeting after it has been approved by all their committee members. (Minutes 8-15-06) Recommendations from committees are to be a consensus of the majority of Committee members, not just the opinion of the Chair. It is helpful for the BOD to even include the total votes (not names) of the Committee members on an issue in your report.

Please let the ALSA office know if you see something you think is incorrect.



Jackson County 4-H Love of Llamas Year in Review



The 4-H motto, "To make the best better", focuses on the idea of youth reaching their highest potential through the engagement of challenging activities and giving back to their community. The Jackson County 4-H Love of Llamas club takes this motto to heart. Through weekly meetings the youth collaborate and implement many activities that help them develop their independence and leadership skills and increase their awareness of the positive impact they can have on their community through service.

This year we had three new club members who hit the barn running, so to say. Lilly Howell, Isabelle and Ava Olliff all became actively engaged in both the educational studies and hands-on work necessary to understand and work with large exotic animals. Each girl had obstacles to overcome and learned the value of hard work, patience, and fortitude. Learning to groom, feed, and care for llamas may be fun, but it is also a lot of work and takes a deep level of commitment. With the help of senior members Cody Avery, Andie Ellett, and Elizabeth Ingram the younger

members became much more sure of themselves and participated in many community events. Here is a review of some of their accomplishments.

An open house in June welcomed youth ages 9 – 18 to visit the farm and learn about llamas and the 4-H program. August was the beginning of show season and several youth participated. Shows included the NC Mountain State Fair Llama Show in Fletcher, NC; GA National Fair in Perry, GA; Winter Classic at Chicopee Woods in Gainesville, GA; and the Hillbilly Llama Show in Perry, GA.

Community activities included Holiday
Parades; visiting home bound patients, the annual
Jefferson Easter Egg Hunt where llamas become long
eared "ramas"! Participation at an elementary school
where students could get a photo with a llama in red
pajama during Read Across America Day raised more
than \$700 for Relay for Life. Larger all-day events
included the Girl Scout Animal Day which the youth
developed, organized, and implemented for a

fullday badge earning event for over 75 Girl Scouts ages 5-18 was a huge success. The Blue Ridge Scenic Railway event was tied in with the fall train rides to Farmer Brown's Pumpkin Patch where the youth meet the public with llamas in costumes as engineers, train crew and in fall attire, and llama learning took place.


Another highlight was the 2017 SSLA
Conference and Annual Membership Meeting at the
Mountain Lodge in Flat Rock, NC where several
youth were honored. Cody Avery received the SSLA
Grand Champion Year End Award for Special Youth in
both Showmanship and Performance; Kate
Dutton received the SSLA Reserve Champion Year
End Award for Junior Youth in both Showmanship and
Performance; Andie Ellett received the SSLA Grand
Champion Year End Award for Intermediate Youth
in Showmanship and the SSLA Reserve Champion
for Intermediate Youth in Performance; Lilly Howell
received the SSLA Third Place Year End Award in
Showmanship and the SSLA Participation as Youth
Ambassador; and Elizabeth Ingram received the SSLA

Third Placement Senior Youth in Performance and the SSLA Fourth Placement Senior Youth in Showmanship.

"Making the best better" is about achieving through hard work and commitment; it's about learning independence and being proud of invested accomplishments. As we come to the end of the school year and regular club meetings the youth have a lot to reflect upon and a few events to be excited about. Looking ahead June is already booked with four library visits where the llamas will appear in red pajamas in memory of Anna Dewdney, the author of the Llama, Llama, Red Pajama books.

In preparation for another successful year we have looked ahead to plan our Annual Open House Recruitment Day. The Jackson County 4-H Love of Llamas club will be hosting the Open House on Sunday, August 13, 2017 at 3 pm. More Than You Ever Imagined!

A large number of the population seems to have the idea that the 4-H program is just about livestock and corn. In today's world, that couldn't be further from the truth.

The 4-H youth development program of the Cooperative Extension originated as early as 1898 because of a need to improve life in rural areas. Improved methods of farming and homemaking taught youth in 4-H to "learn by doing". During those early years, the club program involved growing corn, planting a garden, testing soil, club meetings, and visits to club member's farms and exhibits. Adults in 4-H families were often persuaded to adopt new farming practices because of the successes experienced by the 4-H youth. One hundred years ago, 1907, marked the beginning of 4-H work with the support of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. By 1915 there were 4-H clubs in 47 states.

During the 1920's and the 1930's as the 4-H program continued to grow, more emphasis was placed on the development of the individual rather than the product produced. Programs were focused on development of skills in farming and homemaking.

During the 1950's and 1960's, 4-H saw increasing numbers of non-farm youth enrolling in the program. 4-H became international in 1948 and now exists in at least 80 countries.

Today, Cooperative Extension and 4-H offers youth opportunities in communications, leadership, career development, livestock, home improvement, and computer technology. Programs are found in towns, cities, and rural areas throughout the world.



One hundred years ago, who would have ever imagined that 4-H would include a llama program! But it has happened and there are llama clubs in many states all across our country. Youth involved in these llama programs not only learn about llamas and alpacas and their care, but they develop leadership and communications skills with their club programs. They learn self-improvement and develop self-confidence while presenting themselves to judges and while participating in community involvements with their llamas. The program is instrumental in building life skills in youth and making our communities better places to live and work.

The opportunity for youth not living in rural areas to experience working with a large animal is priceless. And it's also one of the llama and alpaca industry's best marketing tools. These youth are the future of our industry. Many will be entering a career with livestock or agriculture as a result of their 4-H llama experience and many will desire to be involved with raising llamas or alpacas in future years. We are now seeing many of our 4-H llama "graduates" going on to become llama judges with ALSA and 4-H leaders.

If you're not involved in some way with 4-H youth in your community, it's worth looking into.

Become involved - there are many ways you can contribute. It's one of the best marketing tools we have for the future of the llama industry.

The 4-H program today is one dedicated to the development of youth. It will continue to grow and develop with head, heart, hands, and health of youth around the world.






